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
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- Evaluation in Africa is about redress, address structural an other inherited inequalities, democratic, and citizencentred,



- **Prof Sangweni** was visionary in leading the PSC in democratic South Africa, using M&E to improve service delivery standards. His focus was on the tangible changes for citizens.
- Dr Gariba, a keynote emphasized that skills and capacity exist within the continent, to be harnessed to advance development. He spoke against disempowering donor driven evaluation and call for a de-mystifying of the practice and country level drive for M&E

- There has been an emphasis throughout AfrEA growth of locally developed systems and solutions
- Shifts from evaluation by remote, and done as a part of conditionality


UN efforts

- The African Journal of Evaluation is a commendable effort, and milestone






